# Combating Wildlife Trafficking



Wildlife Trafficking is one of the most pressing environmental issues today. It threatens a vast array of species around the world including iconic animals such as the African elephant and rhinos, and many less charismatic species, including plants, as well as local communities, national security and sustainable development.

The objective of the events within this journey is to highlight the serious threat wildlife trafficking poses to biodiversity and provide a space in which Congress attendees can better understand the issues, debate the challenges and formulate innovative and effective solutions.

In particular, it seeks to focus attention on the added value IUCN can deliver in tackling wildlife trafficking through its One Programme approach, which involves government and NGO members, Council, National and Regional Committees of Members, Commissions and the Secretariat working together.
