68 years of vision and impact

Throughout its history, IUCN has brought the expertise and influence of its membership to bear on pressing issues, often ahead of their time and with results that steer the course of humanity's relationship with our planet.

- 1948** Fontainebleau, France
Established the International Union for the Protection of Nature
- 1954** Copenhagen, Denmark
Flagged the effects of insecticides on mammals, birds and insects
- 1960** Warsaw, Poland
Called attention to climate change and its impacts
- 1963** Nairobi, Kenya
Led to the 1974 Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species (CITES)

A NEW ERA FOR HUMANITY'S RELATIONSHIP WITH OUR PLANET

FINANCING NATURE AND NATURAL CAPITAL ACCOUNTING

Nature and economic growth are inextricably linked. How do we account for nature's value? What are the economic risks of business as usual? What investments can we make to better manage natural resources?

ADDRESSING CLIMATE CHANGE

Nature has a critical role to play in the fight against climate change. How do we mobilise our most powerful ally?

BUILDING OCEAN RESILIENCE

Our oceans are in trouble. How do we build ocean resilience to pressures from warming and fishing? How can we prevent plastics from harming marine life and entering our food chain?

YOUTH AND SPIRITUAL LEADERSHIP

Youth and faith have deep connections to nature. How do we better represent these connections and the intrinsic value of nature? How do we mobilise the creativity, energy and innovation of younger generations for conservation?

COMBATTING WILDLIFE TRAFFICKING

Wildlife crime is fuel for conflict, a threat to global security, and it's driving species to extinction. How can we mobilise national action and international cooperation at all levels of government, business, judiciary and civil society?

THE FORUM

The Forum is the largest knowledge marketplace for conservation and sustainable development science, practice and innovation. Over 600 sessions address the economic, social, scientific and technical aspects of issues ranging from wildlife to oceans, protected areas to sustainable business, and climate change to human rights.

THE MEMBERS' ASSEMBLY

IUCN's 1,300+ Member organisations collectively decide on actions to address the most pressing and often controversial conservation and sustainable development challenges. IUCN's membership includes some of the most influential government and civil society organisations from more than 160 countries, giving the decisions taken at the IUCN Congress a powerful mandate.

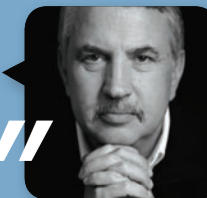

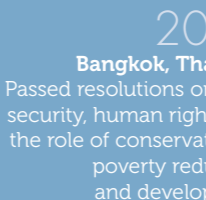
